

# HOW ROOSEVELT WILL DRESS FOR EASTER PARADE

New York, March 26—(AP)—President Roosevelt will be among the nation's best dressed men in the "Easter parade" Sunday in his black cutaway, striped trousers, stiff wing collar and black top hat.

The President, recently named one of sixteen male sartorial leaders by the Merchant Tailors' designers association—to the amusement of Mrs. Roosevelt, who said, "he liked to wear the same thing year after year"—plans to attend church in Washington, in formal morning clothes.

The Easter attire of the other "best dressed men" announced to-day goes far afield from the President's conservative dress.

Fred Astaire, the dancer, will turn out in a gray soft hat, soft white shirt with gay striped tie, gray double-breasted jacket and gray trousers with white chalk

Lactius Beebe, "young man above town" will stroll down Fifth Avenue in an oxford gray lambs' wool morning coat, striped gray chevron trousers, stiff shirt with turn-down collar, double-breasted blue-gray linen waistcoat and a black top hat.

William S. Paley, broadcasting chief, will wear a black braided cutaway, striped trousers, cream linen vest, black top hat and cream-color gloves.

Enzo Piermonte, former prizefighter, will be on his South Carolina plantation with his wife, the former Madeline Force Astor Wick and will attend the village church wearing a semi-sport suit of Shetland wool in a wide black and white herringbone pattern, soft

Senator Willard F. Tyding plans to wear a double breasted dark blue suit, gray soft hat, blue silk tie with pin stripes, dark blue shirt, white shirt, blue tie and no hat.

Frank Chapman, singer and sportsman, husband of Gladys Swarthout, will be attired in a black and white striped jacket and dark gray trousers, striped waistcoat, gray Homberg hat, gray gloves and spats, and will carry a black walking stick with a silver knob.
