

Rotary Clubs Team Up to Aid Handicapped

Red Creek and Wolcott Help Provide Camp for Crippled Children

Plans for the operation of the first camp in this area for physically handicapped children were completed at a meeting of directors representing each of the 20 Rotary Clubs including Red Creek and Wolcott in the counties of Ontario, Seneca, Wayne and Yates at Belhurst, Geneva, Wednesday, June 27. This meeting eliminated a series of meetings, the first of which was called by the Geneva Rotary Club, moving forward in the venture, on Jan. 13.

The facilities of Camp Babcock have been offered by the Finger Lakes Council of the Boy Scouts of America to be used by about 25 boys and girls in the four county area between the ages of 10 and 16 for a camping experience starting Aug. 18 and ending Sept. 1. Any child in the designated age bracket, who would not be eligible for a regular camp program because of the physical disability and who resides in the counties of Ontario, Seneca, Wayne and Yates, may obtain further information about the camp by contacting any Rotarian from the area in which he resides. Applications are being received by the Selection Committee headed by William Shepherd of the Palmyra Rotary Club.

A varied program of arts and crafts, music, modified athletics, swimming, woodcraft, dramatics, nature and planned trips is being planned to make the program a real camping experience for each of the participants.

The 20 Rotary Clubs that are cooperating in this project to make camping an actuality for boys and girls who might not otherwise have such an opportunity were brought together through the efforts of the Geneva Rotary Club and Wesley Haines, past district governor of the 25th district of Rotary International. It is believed this is the first such attempt in this area to carry on such an activity. The Rotary Clubs participating are Geneva, Canandaigua, Clifton Springs, Dundee, Marion, Naples, Newark, Ontario, Penn Yan, Phelps, Red Creek, Sodus, Waterloo, Wolcott, Lyons, Gorham, Palmyra, Seneca Falls and Williamson.

The camp is being fully supported financially by contributions from each of the 20 participating clubs.
