## Rotary Project—

# New Pool Dedicated At Scout Camp

With Rotary, Boy Scouts officials and friends on hand, the new \$40,000 swimming pool was dedicated at Camp Babcock-Hoven yesterday afternoon.

The ceremonies, held in bright sunshine, marked the culmination of years of effort by 20 Rotary Clubs in the 712th district aided by many others. The pool will be used both by the handicapped children campers—a Rotary project—and boy scouts each summer.

Following the dedication ceremonies there was an open swim for the handicapped campers. The season—12th for the group at Babcock-Hoven—will bring to nearly 1,000 the number of nine to 15 year olds who have benefitted from the annual two week programs.

On the program yesterday were representatives of Rotary, the Boy Scouts, and the Easter Seal campaign which annually contributes to the handicapped program. Neil Marvin of Geneva, chairman of the board of directors of the Handicapped Children's Camp and a former district governor of Rotary, was toastmaster.

Participating Rotary Clubs are in Newark, Geneva, Canandaigua, Lyons, Red Creek, Ontario, Palmyra, Clifton Springs, Dundee, Seneca Falls, Clyde, Marion, Naples, Williamson, Waterloo, Phelps, Sodus, Wolcott, Gorham, and Penn Yan.

Introduced by Mr. Marvin for remarks at the ceremony were: the Rev. Richard Manzmann, pastor of North Presbyterian Church in Geneva who gave the invocation; Baird Couch, representing the Easter Seal organization; Gov. Raymond Simmons of the Rotary district; William Hoffman, representing the national scout office; and Donald Borgan, president of Finger Lakes Boy Scout Council, who accepted the pool from Rotary. Also present at the program was Cong. Sam Stratton.

Children with practically any kind of physical disability are accepted at the camp for a two week period each summer. For some the camp provides the only time they can be with children suffering similar ills, for others is the only time they get away from home or the doctor's office; and for all it provides a fellowship and indoctrination of nature's powers that will assist them to become useful citizens. There is no charge to any of the campers.

### In Milk Production—Area Farmers Break Records

SENECA FALLS — Three area farmers have registered Holstein cows that have produced 7,880 lbs. of milk and 285 outstanding amounts of milk and butterfat, according to the Holstein-Friesian Assn. of America.

The new milk production records, the cows that set them and the men that helped them, come from Geneva, Interlaken and Seneca Falls.

John Austin & Son of Geneva are owners and milkers of Austincrest Marcia Burke, a four-year old who produced 18,430 lbs. of milk and 714 lbs. of butterfat in 339 days.

Austincrest Maby Burke is another Austin cow. The three-year old Holstein gave out 19,670 lbs. of milk and 628 lbs. of butterfat in 318 days.

Lewis S. Bell of the Lawara Farm in Interlaken had five record setters. Lawara Mark

J. Lorie, a three-year old, gave 20,120 lbs. of milk and 772 lbs. of butterfat in 304 days. Ola Rag Apple Bridge View, a four-year old beauty, produced 20,750 lbs. of milk and 695 lbs. of butterfat in only 305 days.

A third Lawara cow, five-year old Mark Ann S., had 16,330 lbs. of milk and 687 lbs. of butterfat in 305 days. Three-year old Locust Lodge Inka Kate contributed 17,820 lbs. of milk and 682 lbs. of butterfat in 307 days. Big Elm Skyliner Ann is three years old and a high-flying lady. She gave 19,040 lbs. of milk and 642 lbs. of butterfat, also in 305 days.

In Seneca Falls, Edwin R. Smith owns two record holders. Poplar Point Insignia Jewel, a four-year old cow, proved herself giving out 8,960 lbs. of milk and 696 lbs. of butterfat in 305 days. Poplar Point Son Lottie, a four-year old, produced 17,370 lbs. of milk and 692 lbs. of butterfat in 363 days.

ITHACA — At a recent meeting of the Cayuga Lake Preservation Assn., President Robert Castelli of Union Springs, announced the acceptance of two new directors to its board. The newly elected directors are Robert O. Dingman, Supt. of Public Works in Ithaca, and Laurence H. McDaniels, professor emeritus of Horticulture at the N. Y. State College of Agriculture, Cornell University in Ithaca. Resignations from Edward Melchen of Ithaca and Theodore Bogart of Geneva were accepted.

The Cayuga Lake Preservation Assn. is mainly responsible for getting the Cayuga Lake Basin study underway two years ago. The study of examining the water resources and pollution problems of the Cayuga Lake Basin will probably continue for at least two more years. The directors of the association, which has been dormant for the past year, announced their intention to become active with smaller projects concerning pollution which could go on concurrently with the basin study.
