

Armed man sought in two robberies

Wayne County sheriff's deputies and state police are looking for a man armed with a knife who robbed a Savannah liquor store and a Butler farmer yesterday.

Deputies said they are looking for a white male about 20 years old wearing a blue shirt and blue jeans.

The man entered Savannah Liquor Store on Main Street and robbed a clerk of \$100 at knifepoint about 5 p.m., deputies said. The clerk, Alicia Kelly, was tending the store for owner Frank Dhondt. She was not injured.

Chief deputy Raymond Herold said the man sought in the liquor store robbery answers the description of a suspect state police are looking for in connection with the theft of \$80 from a Butler farmer.

George E. Colvin, 79, was held up at knifepoint at his home at 4978 Wolcott-Spring Lake Road about 5:40 p.m., police said.

Neither Colvin nor his wife, Marjorie, 75, was injured during the robbery. They are the parents of Savannah Town Supervisor Donald Colvin.

Scouts to dedicate camp building

OID — The Shenandoah Shelter, a multi-purpose building at Camp Babcock-Hovey will be dedicated at a 3 p.m. ceremony Saturday, as part of the Shenandoah District camporee program.

Tom Lewis, Shenandoah District camping chairman, will serve as master of ceremonies for the event, which will honor those persons and corporations whose donations made the construction of the shelter possible. More than \$8,200 was raised for the shelter at the Shenandoah District Bowl-A-Thon in 1979.

The building was raised last spring, and was used for teaching classes in inclement weather during the 1979 camping season. The shelter is also available for large-group meetings and picnics during the summer camping season, and for winter camping.

The shelter will be dedicated in honor and memory of the Cubs, Scouts, Explorers and their leaders from the Shenandoah District of the Finger Lakes Council, Boy Scouts of America. The council is a participating member of the United Way.

How They Voted

WASHINGTON — Here's how area members of Congress were recorded on major roll call votes April 17 through April 23:

HOUSE

DRAFT REGISTRATION — By a vote of 219 for and 180 against, the House approved spending \$13 million to begin registering young men for possible draft into the military service. The bill (HJ Res 521) was sent to the Senate.

If the registration plan gets final approval, the approximately four million men born in 1960 and 1961 will be required to fill out forms at their local post offices.

Members voting yes favor draft registration.

Rep. Gary Lee, R-33, voted yes. Reps. Frank Horton, R-34, and Barber Conable, R-35, voted no.

IRAN PROBE — The House killed, 314 for and 90 against, a resolution (H Res 627) calling for a probe of one aspect of the administration's dealings with the Iranian government. The probe was to have looked into the conciliatory letter the Iranians claimed to have received from President Carter in late March. Carter repudiated the letter, which, according to the claim of Rep. George Hansen, R-Idaho, was written by an Argentine lawyer working as an intermediary between Washington and Iran in the hostage negotiations.

Members voting no want to debate and vote on a resolution questioning one aspect of the Administration's Iran policy.

Conable voted yes. Lee and Horton voted no.

INTERNATIONAL BANKS — By a vote of 211 for and 180 against, the House sent back to a House-Senate conference committee a bill (S 662) setting the level of U.S. contributions to the Inter-American Development Bank, Asian Development Bank, and African Development Fund. The bill called for \$4 billion in contributions through 1982, compared to the \$2.5 billion the House voted in March.

Members voting yes favor a lower contribution to the banks.

Lee voted yes. Horton and Conable voted no.

SENATE

THE LUBBERS NOMINATION — The Senate confirmed, 57 for and 39 against, the nomination of William A. Lubbers as general counsel of the National Labor Relations Board (NLRB), the independent agency established in 1934 to mediate differences between labor and management. Lubbers was seen as "pro-labor" by conservatives, and organized labor regarded his confirmation as a victory.

Senators voting yes want Lubbers to be the NLRB's top lawyer.

Sens. Jacob Javits, R, and Daniel Moynihan, D, voted yes.

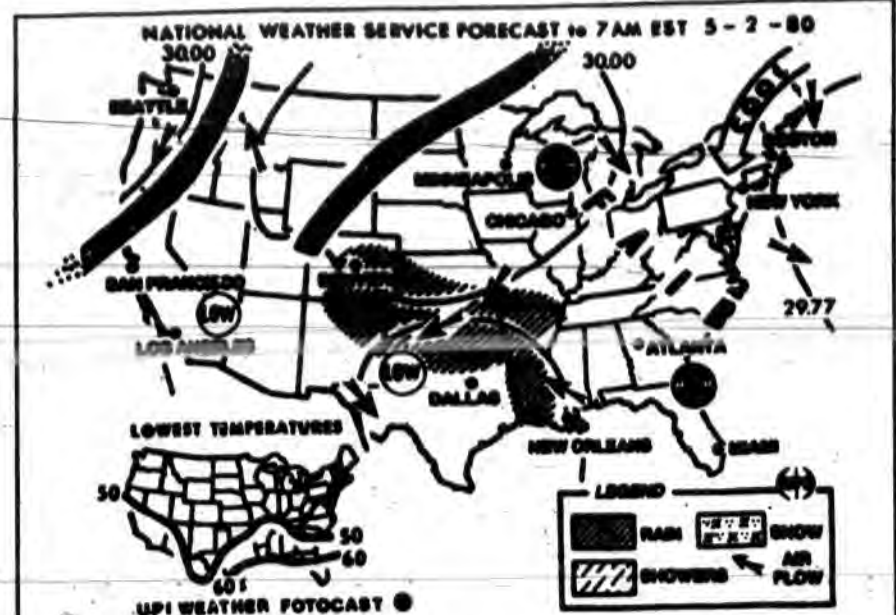
