## Buffalo weather 'flaky' for December

**BUFFALO, N.Y. (AP)** — It just doesn't make sense. Making snow in Buffalo in December?

Yet that's exactly what the Chamber of Commerce had to do when a ski exhibition at the city's first Winterfest was threatened by the unlikely absence of snow in a city known for its nasty winters.

"It could have been worse," said Chamber spokeswoman Karen Wodarczak. "It could have been a blizzard and then nobody could have come to our events."

But for area businesses who depend on snow, it's tough to look at the bright side.

"We're starving," said Vic Puglia, operator of Kenmore Collision, an auto body shop which normally has its biggest month of the year in December.

Puglia and others are beginning to feel the effects of what National Weather Service meteorologist Debbie Bauer described as one of the top 10 snowless Decembers in

the city's history.

Coming 12 months after the 68.4 inches of snow that made the last month of 1985 the snowiest December ever in Buffalo, Bauer said she's not complaining.

"This way, we don't get many complaints because people are happy this is happening," she said of the 4.8-inch snow total for the month and the 18.5-inch total since Oct. 1. On average, Buffalo gets 22.8 inches of snow during December and 33.9 inches between October and the end of December.

Wodarczak said the no-snow show may have helped alter the perception of Buffalo given by famous blizzards in 1977 and 1985.

"It's just one more interesting aspect, especially for the national media, that there's a Winterfest go-

ing on in Buffalo even though there's no snow," she said.

However, Gary Cameron is proud of not everybody is pleased with the winter that hasn't come.

"It's slow," said Gary Cameron, owner of Bud's Service, a snowmobile sales and service shop in suburban Kenmore. "Basically, there's nothing."

Cameron said that last year's heavy snowfall helped his store "have a pretty good preseason" that is offsetting the severe drop in business this month.

"Since the first week of December, everything stopped dead," he said.

"It does put a real crimp in your cash flow," he added. "Everything's going out and nothing's coming in."

Cameron estimated his business

was off about \$135,000 in sales and service from last December. Normally, if there is just one average snow storm, he sells 50 to 100 snowblowers in December. This year, he's sold "10 or 20 at the most."

In Ellicottville, 40 miles south of Buffalo in the heart of western New York's ski country, a ski shop official said sales are "way down."

Craig Wittmann, assistant manager of the Red Door Ski Shop, said the relatively snow-free winter "has really cut into our business being an area shop like we are. We're so reliant on these two weeks around Christmas."

He said his business has really been hurt by slow sales in ski clothing and accessories.

Wittmann said that while sales are down, "We haven't suffered too badly because we're able to keep it up with repairs."
