## Babcock-Hovey plans to mark golden jubilee

Scouts from throughout Ontario, Wayne, Seneca and Yates Counties have been named to a special committee to plan and administer a giant Boy Scout Camporee to commemorate the Golden Jubilee of Camp Babcock-Hovey.

The camporee will be Oct. 2, 3 and 4 at the Finger Lakes Council's camp on the east shore of Seneca Lake.

Ken Martin of Ontario has been named to head the committee. He will be assisted by Peter Heiderich and Jim Van Aiken, Naples; Mike Reese, Waterloo; Jim Stenzel, Phelps; Bob Purvis, Farmington and Hank Roenke and Jan Boyle, Geneva.

Martin says program details are still being finalized, but that all of Scouting's program areas — Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts and Explorers — are planning activities during the weekend. He says the highlight of the weekend will be Saturday afternoon when the camp is rededicated.

The first land purchase for the camp was made in 1937 using resources provided by Birton Babcock and Harry Hovey. Two additional land acquisitions expanded the camp to its present 362-acre size.

Camp Babcock-Hovey is used year around by the Finger Lakes

Council Boy Scouts of America. For five weeks in the summer, Boy Scouts spend a week or more at the facility.

Wobebos, members of Scouting's 10-year-old Cub Scout/Boy Scout transition group, also spend a week at Camp Babcock-Hovey, and one of the five Council Cub Scout Day Camps is at the facility.

Throughout the rest of the year, individual troops camp at Babcock-Hovey during weekends. In late August, the camp is used by the Rotary Clubs of the four-county area for Camp Onsewaya, a camp for handicapped children.

## Falls GOP committee picks challenger

**SENECA FALLS** — Town Republicans have unseated one-term incumbent councilman Paul Kronenwetter in favor of political newcomer Maureen Pynack.

"Win some, lose some," said Kronenwetter after his defeat at yesterday's party caucus. The Lower Lake Road resident said he'll consider mounting an independent campaign to keep his seat on the board.

He was the only incumbent opposed at the caucus. Winning renomination were Supervisor Frank Saracino, Councilman Allyn Morehouse, Town Clerk Nicaletta Greer, Highway Superintendent Al Andrews and Tax Collector Joyce Mahoney.

Mrs. Pynack, of East Bayard Street Extension, defeated Kronenwetter 44-35.

"I was hoping I wouldn't have to challenge anybody, but it didn't work out that way," she said, declining to say why she chose to run against Kronenwetter instead of Morehouse.

Kronenwetter speculated some neighborhood disagreements on Lower Lake Road may have led some people to vote against him, but he declined to be more specific.

Mrs. Pynack, who has worked 18 years as a visiting nurse in the Seneca County Public Health Department, served about two years on the Seneca Falls Hospital Board of Managers before the facility closed. After her appointment to the hospital board, she was frequently an observer at town board meetings.

Saracino was first elected supervisor in 1971 and has been re-elected seven times, often without opposition.

Morehouse has been on the town board since 1978. Mrs. Greer was appointed town clerk in 1984 and won election in 1985. Andrews has been highway superintendent since 1981.

Only Saracino, who is also chairman of the county Board of Supervisors, is running for a two-year term. The rest are seeking four-year terms.



## Committee to write job specifications

**MANCHESTER** — A committee will be appointed next week to plan for hiring a code enforcement officer to work for the town and its three villages.

Village and town officials met Monday and decided to appoint a representative from each municipality to the committee, which will develop a job description, salary, and a plan for dividing costs among Manchester town and village, and the villages of Gorham and Clifton Springs, said Man-

chester Supervisor William Ed-

dinger.

The committee's recommendations, expected by the end of the month, will be turned over to the town and village attorneys, who will draw up a legal agreement, Ed-dinger said.

Officials hope to hire someone to begin the job Jan. 1, 1988, he said.

Each of the municipalities now has a part-time code enforcement officer, who handles zoning and fire codes.

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
